MEETING CALLED TO ORDER - INTRODUCTIONS

The Chair called the meeting to order at 9:00 a.m., welcomed everyone and asked that they introduce themselves -- committee, staff and members of the audience.

APPROVAL OF MINUTES OF JULY 26, 1991

The chair asked for any additions or corrections to the minutes. Having no corrections, he then asked for a motion to adopt the

minutes. It was moved and seconded to adopt the minutes of July 26, 1991 -- the motion carried by voice vote.

The chair then asked if there were any additions or deletions to the agenda. There were none, it was moved and seconded to adopt the agenda -- the motion carried.

AWARD OF CERTIFICATES

Bill Fearn read the resolution for STAN BILES with Dr. Scull presenting the certificate to Stan for all his hard work as the designee from Department of Natural Resources. The chair asked for a motion to adopt the resolution. It was moved and seconded. The motion carried.

The chair then read the resolution for HEBER KENNEDY, who served on the TAC, with a certificate of appreciation to be presented at a later time. The chair asked for a motion to adopt the resolution. It was moved and seconded -- the motion carried.

DIRECTOR'S REPORT

Director Wilder indicated that it has "been fun." Everyone is moving in the same direction with not enough money for all. There have been continued talks regarding "unallocated" and the concept of "critical project reserve." He indicated the legislature has given the IAC a new staff position and the new position will be mainly dedicated to the WWRP program. Because of a very heavy workload, there had not been enough time to bring aboard and train the new staff member without impacting other workers and disrupting current programs.

The only agency legislative considerations this year would be reintroduction of the operations and maintenance issue. However, because of the potential tax impact, that piece of legislation will be carefully evaluated. The last item was the WWRP annual report which will be prepared and ready for the November meeting.

MANAGEMENT SERVICES REPORT

The report was presented by Mr. Ray Baker with the "fund summary" as the first report. It represents receipts through July, 1991. The report included the effects of the new biennium's legislation with new projects added as well as dropping projects that did not have contracts and were not reappropriated by the legislature.

Negative numbers in the report remain in the federal column of the state agencies, reflecting the shortfall in the actual receipts of federal funding as compared to the allotted amount. The numbers include the 91-93 biennium projects, with no revenue for the biennium. There are negative balances on the state agencies side in the 215 column because it includes all the

projects for the biennium, but not all revenue. A 215 negative is normal at the beginning of the biennium. The pending project's list represents committed funding but those projects have not yet received contracts for various reasons.

NOVA was the next report, representing the status of the account at the end of July with August reports not yet available. The funding level is where it should be for the NOVA cycle in November. The amount in each of the categories remains within the mandated parameters.

WWRP was the third summary consisting of four pages. All the legislatively mandated floors have been met and maintained. The first page is a summary of last biennium's "Project 53." The second page is the current biennium activity - totaling \$50 million. The third is a total history of the WWRP project funding and the last page is a different color than the others to remind the committee this represents the State Building and Construction Account. This account carries a proviso that this funding is only for local projects on the WWRP list. Some savings are expected during the year.

The FIREARMS RANGE is the last report. With the first funding session in March, the results of that session and receipts are shown through July. The only constant regarding this is the inconsistency in the monthly amounts. However, it appears the original estimate of total funding available remains quite good.

Mr. Baker concluded the report and asked for questions.

GRANT COUNTY/MOSES LAKE SAND DUNES REPORT

In 1989, the Grant County Sheriff's Department requested assistance to purchase 903.5 acres of land for the Moses Lake Sand Dunes ORV Riding Area. During the November 1989 funding session the IAC approved a 100 percent grant in the amount of \$465,250 for the proposed acquisition.

After entering into the agreement, the county had the properties appraised. The county then offered to purchase the properties for the appraised values, however, the owners were unwilling to sell for the appraised value of \$500 to \$750 per acre. Isaak Land Partnership, owner of the largest parcels, indicated they would sell but only at \$1250 per acre.

The county, realizing they could not purchase everything they wanted with the approved grant evaluated their options and established a plan. They solicited the input of the primary user groups and through the recommendations of IAC staff and the NOVA advisory committee they requested approval to amend their

existing Project Agreement to include the purchase of a 25 year lease for 570 acres of DNR school trust property and the acquisition priorities for the remaining properties.

The Isaak land was split into two 320 acre projects and the county submitted two new applications to the IAC for purchase of Isaak Land Partnership at \$1250 per acre. The county then tried to get a reviewed appraisal to justify paying the \$1250 per acre. The method of appraisal could not be used because it was not in compliance with the IAC approved appraisal guidelines.

The county is now requesting IAC approval to purchase the land at the 67% increase. As part of the condition in the land purchase they are asking to use any remaining funds to install boundary fencing.

The IAC staff has reviewed and recommends that the IAC Director be authorized to approved the purchase of the property by Grant County at the cost in excess of the appraised value.

Jan Tveten asked if the owner had been approached regarding friendly condemnation to establish a price or has an arbitration panel been explored? Neither had. With additional land closures soon in the area, and because American Potato will put more of their property under agricultural development, the committee must make a decision today. Committee members also asked if paying the higher asking price would be a wise use of IAC funding.

The chair asked for a motion to accept the resolution regarding purchase of the Isaak Land. There was no support among committee members for the resolution. For discussion purposes, a motion was made by Stan Biles to accept the resolution, it was seconded by Jan Tveten. Discussion followed with Jan Tveten expressing he was troubled with the asking price being more than the original appraisal. Stan Biles commented he thought there was no danger or lack of public access in that area if the land was not purchased.

Richard Burk from the Eastern Washington Dirt Riders spoke in support of the purchase as did the Northwest Motorcycle Club and the Pacific Northwest Four Wheel Drive Association as well as a telephone call to Larry Fairleigh from Representative Chandler who is also in support of the purchase.

After the discussion and supporting comments the committee voted on the motion. The motion did not carry.

WASHINGTON WILDLIFE & RECREATION PROJECTS FUNDING CONSIDERATION

Each project was presented via slides and a brief oral and printed description:

Urban Wildlife

The following Urban Wildlife Projects were presented to the committee by IAC staff for funding consideration (Table 2). Upon completion of the presentation, Jim Fox asked if any of the presented projects were threatened by development or was that part of the evaluation or scoring process? Jan Tveten questioned if monies to fund these projects are from the 91-93 habitat fund summary? Gary Ogden explained.

Stan Biles was concerned with regard to the amount of projects in Western Washington and only one in Eastern Washington. Did the evaluation process preclude Eastern Washington projects? Mr. Fairleigh assured Mr. Biles it did not. The chair asked for any additional questions or comments regarding the Urban Wildlife Projects.

Water Access

The next presentation was on Water Access Projects (Table 2). The chair asked about wetland protection in the Forbes Lake project and if you could protect wetlands with the high intensive use of park. The answer was, most of the park would be developed except for 2 or 3 acres which would be left natural. The chair again asked if this natural area would survive well or get trampled? Under these circumstances, a natural area did survive well. The water access presentation was concluded with the chair asking for questions or comments.

Trails

The next presentation was trails projects (Table 2). The Chair asked that the slide of the Green River Trail, Phase I be shown again for clarification. There was a question with regard to the Tub Lake Interpretive Trail, as to the relationship of wildlife and public use of SeaTac Airport. Was the trail directly in landing pattern and did it support much wildlife? The area is very very noisy but does support abundant wildlife. With the presentation completed the chair asked for any questions or discussion.

Jan Tveten commented that Parks has worked with Yakima and the condemnation process for the trail, the Greenway Path. Yakima is an area where the Greenway Path has been identified as one of President Bush's Points of Light.

Mr. Tveten also asked regarding the Wahl Trail linking Pullman with Idaho, if Idaho was committed to getting the trail to the University of Idaho? The chair asked for questions or discussion on trails projects.

Local Parks

The next presentation was on Local Parks (Table 2). After this final presentation the chair announced the committee would work through the lunch period to allow testimony from citizens who had traveled a some distance. The committee then took a very short break and reconvened at 11:55 a.m. The chair also asked that if there was anyone wishing to comment on any of these projects, they must fill out one of the yellow cards, found on the table in the back of the room, and give it to the chair. The chair would then call on them.

WWRP FUNDING RECOMMENDATIONS

After reconvening, Larry Fairleigh gave committee members the project staff recommendations. These were also distributed among the audience. As of May 1991, the IAC had received a total of 107 applications for the WWRP application cycle with a total of \$26,101,795 million requested. With withdrawals, the number of projects to be considered is now at 76. The projects that are approved today will be forwarded to the Governor's Office prior to October 1, for consideration by the 1992 Legislature.

On each of the recommendation sheets there are two projects identified as alternates. The green sheet reflected staff recommendations on parks through #13, the lavender reflected staff recommendations on trails through #4, the pink reflected staff recommendations on urban wildlife through #6 and the yellow reflected staff recommendations on water access through #3. There are also a certain number of projects that will "die" and not proceed. Any additional funds will be distributed to alternate projects or moved between categories.

Jan Tveten asked what the procedure was for sharing the project recommendations from the Governor's Office to the legislature? Director Wilder responded, but did not know how Governor's Office handled this. He also reminded the committee, they will not have another chance to act on these projects. The chair asked for questions.

Jan Tveten pointed out the inequity in geographical distribution on the scoring for the trails projects. Because King County had been granted almost \$976,075 in funding, should dialogue with

King County begin to see if they might be willing to consider a more even distribution on a statewide basis. Since no discussion had been held it seemed logical to do this so one county does not move forward with 90% of the funding in one category. He suggested there be some discussion and rethinking on this.

After committee discussion regarding the funding recommendations, the following individuals addressed the IAC in favor of certain projects to be funded.

After the comments were completed, the chair asked for additional testimony. With no further comments, he thanked everyone for coming and their interest. He also urged everyone participating in the meeting to get back to their legislators and ask for additional funding. He felt it was an urgent need.

The chair asked if someone from King County wished to speak to perhaps swapping one of their projects for the Douglas County project. Bob Jacobs from King County Parks stated he felt the Green River Trails Project could be moved but was not offering it up. He thought King County could switch places with Douglas County but left it to committee decision.

Jan Tveten commented that many times in these difficult situations, if left to the participating agencies, things could usually be worked out between them.

Mr. Tveten then made a motion to amend staff recommendations by switching the King County, Green River Trail, Phase I with the

Douglas County, Columbia River trail system project. Just switching the order of those two. This was seconded by Mary Nielsen. The chair then asked for discussion. Rich Costello queried since the Douglas County property was within DOT right-of-way, is it eligible for DOT funding support under grant programs that they receive money? Douglas County supporters assured the committee that they felt money was available through DOT but this type of funding through had not ever been done. DOT was investigating through their Attorney General.

Rich Costello also asked on what basis DOT retains ownership of the right-of-way? Is it a permanent decision or are they holding on to title based on future capacity to serve motor vehicle use? Larry Fairleigh explained that staff had reviewed the lease document extensively and suggested, before anything could be done there would have to be some revisions before the property would be eligible. After discussion was complete the chair asked for a vote on the motion. **Motion carried** by voice vote.

Jim Fox asked if the committee had the authority to shift funds between categories and was told they could. Bill Fearn recommended the committee follow IAC staff's recommendations on shifting funding. Jim Fox then made a motion to move the line on the Park recommendations so it falls between #10 and #11 and shift the savings to urban wildlife and by moving the line down to include project #7 and then adding project #9 as an alternate. The chair asked for discussion and then a second on the motion. The motion failed for lack of a second. Mary Nielsen did finally second the motion for purposes of discussion. The motion failed again with a vote of committee members.

The chair asked for a **motion to accept the trails projects as amended**. Jan Tveten moved, Stan Biles seconded the motion and it was carried by voice vote. The next was a **motion to accept the parks projects** as recommended by staff, Bill Fearn moved, it was seconded by Mary Nielsen, **motion carried**. Committee moved on to **accept the recommendations for the water access projects**. It was moved by Jan Tveten, seconded by Mary Nielsen and the **motion carried** by voice vote. The last category was **urban wildlife with a motion made by Mary Nielsen**, seconded by Bill Fearn and **carried** by voice vote.

1992 SUPPLEMENTAL BUDGET

Mr. Gary Ogden give the report which included an appropriation of \$1,750,000 in the IAC Capital Budget for reconstruction of Clear Creek Dam. In order to meet the need of a United States Forest

Service Challenge Grant and to allow the Federal Bureau of Reclamation to continue design work on the project, the Governor decided to award \$200,00 from his Emergency Fund to the IAC to support this state's share of the design costs.

The Governor has committed to seek restoration of the \$1,550,000 via a Supplemental Capital Budget for the IAC. The IAC is currently in the process of preparing a project contract with the Bureau of Reclamation as requested by OFM.

The prepared resolution supports the request from the Governor's office to be included in the Supplemental Budget. Stan Biles wanted to make a motion so that the resolution tied in with recreation in some fashion. He asked that the language in the resolution be changed to, "Whereas the Clear Creek Dam provides a valuable recreation opportunity and" The motion was seconded by Bill Fearn. The motion carried by voice vote.

COMMITTEE ADJOURNMENT

The Chair asked if there was any further business to come before the committee and then declared the meeting to be adjourned. The next meeting will be on November 14-15 at the Tyee Motor Inn.
